PASTORAL LETTER

Nov. 28, 2025



Last Friday, I arrived at Royal Court for the chapel service. I was early, so I visited with the puppy behind the welcome desk, who has grown so much! He was very curious about me, and I made a big deal about him. The staff are so good there.

When I walked in, I noticed that the residents had completely changed the setup of the chapel, which surprised me. Someone said, "You should have seen the look on your face!" Ordinarily, I am against change, and I commented on the new

"Anglican style" pulpit. A person asked me what I meant by that, to which I replied, "United Church pulpits are higher."

Later that afternoon, I had that feeling that I was getting sick. I had things to do, so I powered through, and by the evening, I was on the couch feeling like I had the flu. I finally went to bed, and by the next morning, I felt like I had the plague. By Sunday morning, I started feeling a bit of relief, so I heavily medicated myself, masked up, and went to church, avoiding as many people as I could. That afternoon, I went back to bed

Eli was working on a painting for school. He was modelling it after the painter Bob Ross who many of you remember from his show on PBS years ago. Bob is the guy who talks about lonely little trees and painting one beside it so they'll have a friend. Eli had his headphones on, watching Bob Ross talk about painting on YouTube, and we laughed when we heard Eli say, "Ok, Bob. Let's see how these happy little accidents turn out!" I was shocked when he showed me the painting a few days later! Eli's grandmother, Shirley, is a painter, and she was giving him lots of little tips. It was nice to see.

Through the week, I had an unusual amount of calls and requests for visits. I was feeling better, though I still sounded sick. There were meetings, including parent-teacher. Sadly, I had a call from Frenette's Funeral Home that Denis Cool had died. Denis was Pat Haye's husband, and I'd gotten to know him over the years. He wasn't very old, which added to the sadness. I'd also received word that Peter Avard died, the nephew of Hugh Donald.

I went to visit with Peter's wife, Peggy, who was lovely. She's a retired ER nurse who knows many people in our church. When I walked into her living room, I was greeted by her cat, Cujo, who is a Maine Coon. Years ago, we had a Maine Coon named Lady Petunia. I told this to Peggy, and within a few minutes, we realized that our cats were from the same breeder and had the same father, who was named Merlin. So, I was very happy to see him, since I miss our cat so much.

The next day, I had a coffee with a colleague, many of you know, named Rev. Mary MacPherson, who used to be the minister at Mountain View. Lori-Ann and I have always liked Mary, so it was good to

catch up with her. Mary has started a spiritual substack where she shares her writings, and as I told her, she is an excellent writer. I still remember a Good Friday sermon that Mary preached many years ago.

The next day, I went to visit Pat, whom many of us know and love. Her daughter was there too. She used to come to church with her daughter, who is now in high school. As we were talking, Pat's daughter said, "You look exactly like my father did." I looked at Pat with my eyebrow raised, and she smiled and said, "You do look a lot like him." Pat's first husband died from a stroke when he was fifty years old. As we kept talking, her daughter said to me, "It's haunting how much you look like him." I smiled and said, "Well, I'm about his age now, so maybe that's part of it?" They showed me an old black and white photo of him. We made arrangements for the service. It was to be short. Denis' mother used to be a Senator, Rose-Marie Losier-Cool said she was happy that I was doing it.

That afternoon, my friend Rev. Jeff Doucette interviewed me on Skype for an Advent project for his church that he wanted to share with his congregation, where we talked about hope through the lens of social media and my ministry called "Unvirtuous Abbey." Jeff's a big fan of it, and he's so joyful. Some of you may remember him when he was Father Jeff, a Roman Catholic priest in Riverview. He's now married and living in Ontario with his farm animals and congregation.

Another friend had reached out to talk, the Rev. Alan Rudnick, who is a Baptist pastor in Syracuse, New York. Alan and I met through social media years ago. He has a business kind of mind, only a Baptist can have about how you measure ministry and deliverables. He likes how I make his mother laugh online.

On Friday morning, I was asked to go pray with a family whose wife and mother had died. I walked in, met everyone and had a prayer. A guy came over to me and asked, "Are you an Anglican?" I said that I am sometimes accused of that, and he told me that he and his wife were strong Anglicans in Ontario until the day that their priest wouldn't marry their daughter, who was engaged to a man who had been divorced, so they had to go to the United Church. When it came time for their baby to be baptized, the priest refused for whatever reason. He said, "So now we don't go to church at all." After talking for a bit, we realized that we had a friend in common from the Air Traffic Controller world, so I took a selfie and sent it to the person.



On Saturday, I had the service for Denis. I walked in, and there was a big crowd. I gave Pat a hug, and went to see Denis' mother. I knelt before her and offered my sincerest condolences. She is a wonderful person. I met with the people taking part, including retired Judge Mike McKee, who, as many of you know, is a prince of a man. As I knelt to talk to him, he was seated in the chapel holding his cane. He looked regal to me, even though he was smartly dressed in a suit. Denis' family are French Roman Catholics, so they asked Mike to take part since he used to be a Roman Catholic priest before he married his wife, Winnie. He was so generous with his praise of me, and I was a bit humbled by it all. "You have such a good name in our city, Aaron." I thanked him and quickly moved on to his role in the service. A friend gave a bilingual eulogy.

When it came time to begin, I welcomed everyone there. Earlier that morning, I had asked a friend of mine (who is a lawyer in Saint John) to help me translate some words into French, as I believe it's important to speak to people in their first language. This is what I said:

« Je viens de Cap Breton, alors je peux sacrer en gaélique, mais malheureusement mon français n'est pas trop fort. Je veux quand même souhaiter la bienvenue aux amis et à la famille de Denis dans leur langue. L'Évangile sera lue aujourd'hui par Juge Mike McKee, qui dira aussi une prière. »

Basically, it says, "I don't know a lot of French, but I can swear in Gaelic."

Afterwards, I was talking with Judge McKee, who said he hadn't forgotten about our promise to have a coffee someday. A man approached him and started speaking to him in French, so I touched Mike's

arm, nodded, and walked away. Mike said, "Aaron, this man would like to meet you." The man said to me, "My friend Denis has given me a great gift. For the first time in my life, I saw Catholics and Protestants lead a funeral, in French and English, and I never thought that I'd live to see the day. Thank you." I was deeply moved by that. What he said to me was so beautiful that I teared up a bit, shook his hand and thanked him for his kindness.

I walked back over to the church and went over all my notes for the next day, which was to be our church's 187th anniversary. There was a lot going on, and I was trying to keep it all together. I had received a few messages that morning about things that had been forgotten in the bulletin, so I had to make a few phone calls.

When I arrived on Sunday morning, there was a nice energy in the building as the choir rehearsed, people were bringing in food, and there seemed to be kids everywhere. Our Pastoral Care and Membership Chair, Valerie Roy, came to my office and signed certificates. Then, our Worship and Music Chair, Sheri Brooks, came and signed certificates. I signed them all.



I walked out of my office and met a photographer who asked me where he should stand. I told him to get the photos he needed because it was a special time for Robins (that is the correct spelling) and Sharon, whose daughter Deborah was being baptized. Robins and Sharon are originally from India, now living in Moncton. Family from home would be watching online, too.

I remember when I first met Robins and Sharon in church. They were so kind. They are Mona Miller's neighbours. They asked if they could meet me in my office to discuss Deborah's "Dedication", as they called it. I wasn't sure what their original religion was (I only knew it likely wasn't the United Church of Canada). So as we talked, I asked, "What is your religious background in India?" Robins said, "Oh! I was a Catholic and Sharon was a Protestant. I had to convert to marry her as people of different religions aren't permitted to get married." Well, paint me green and call me a pickle. That wasn't the answer I was expecting! I told them that I would be very happy to baptize Deborah, who was at home with her grandmother.

We were also giving Bibles that day to the nine-year-olds in our church (and those who'd previously didn't get one), so they were stacked on the piano. The membership packages were stacked on the pulpit. The baptismal font was front and centre. Two pink chairs were placed at the front for the conversation I would have with Debby Warren in place of a sermon. Each time I walked into the sanctuary, I saw more and more people. It almost felt like Christmas Eve, there were so many.

Debby came into my office when she got to church. Kimberley walked us through how the microphones would work. Some people who knew Debby came to say hello. It was exciting. I told Debby that the wooden table in my office used to be in my grandmother's living room for decades, so now I

consider it like her living room with the old chairs. Debby told me that her great-grandmother and her grandmother used to bring her to the Baptist Church in Sunny Brae, and she remembers falling asleep on their laps in church. Such a warm memory. And such a spiritual inheritance to have received our grandmother's faith.

The service was fantastic. The choir sounded beautiful in person. The church was packed. The kids received their Bibles. Baby Deborah was baptized. A young girl named Anna was baptized, too. She came up to the front by herself as her parents and grandmother watched from the pew. This was all her decision, and







they supported her 100 percent, as I did, too. It's quite something to look at a young person in the eyes as they make their baptismal vows and pour water on their head. Afterwards, Chris MacQueen said to me, "It must be the best feeling to baptize a baby." I smiled and said Indeed, it is. Debby told heartbreaking yet hopeful stories, and there were lots of tears in the congregation, including my own, after she told the story of Luke, who died in front of City Hall a few years ago due to homelessness and addiction.

Everyone gathered for the Loaves and Fishes potluck, which was delightfully chaotic. There was indeed enough food for everyone. There was such joy in the room. One person commented that it had been forever since she'd been to a good old church potluck, and she had forgotten how wonderful they were. Dr. Nancy Vogan was there, and we had a nice talk. She said, "I was thinking this morning that I've been coming to this

church since I was baptized as a baby." Likely, it was the same font. I asked her who baptized her, and she said, "Dr. Archibald." I replied, "Of course, let's go get a picture with him!"

I had to make my way to Riverview for a wedding. A couple had called me months before and asked if I would marry them in their living room. They couldn't find anyone to do it. They had friends who

mentioned me. I said, "I'd be happy to do your wedding." They'd been together for 18 years, two kids, two cats, and they met while working at Rogers. When I arrived, their townhouse was full of friends and family. And cats! We went into the kitchen, where there was food on the counters, and I went over the paperwork and the ceremony. "We just want to get married!" they said in response to what they wanted. So I did the ceremony and pronounced them husband and wife right there in the kitchen. When I said those words, the bride burst into tears and the groom's smile couldn't have been bigger as he hugged her. I took a picture right away to capture the moment. They thanked me, I played with the cats, and then I went visiting.



After I got home from the hospital that night, I said to my wife, "We'll never have a better day in church than that one."





On Tuesday, our Sanctuary was decorated for Christmas by our Custodian Pat Arsenault, Barb McLaughlin and Sharon Alward.

Yesterday, we held the funeral service for Peter Avard at St. John's. It was beautiful. The choir led the singing, and as we sang *In the Bulb There is a Flower* the front row was in tears. Hugh Donald and his son Andrew delivered a fine eulogy. Peter's wife's cousin


is an Anglican priest, and she read the scripture. The Rev. Marian Conrad was my friend's supervisor at the Atlantic School of Theology, and I remembered her well. We had a nice talk about church. What a wonderful person and a faithful priest of Christ's church. People were so complimentary of the service at the reception. I think

that's because they aren't used to funerals that are so personal, which we do well at St. John's.

Afterwards, I walked down to the Capital Theatre to get tickets for the Men of the Deeps. My birth father, Joe, gave them to us as a birthday present. His brother, Kevin MacSween, sings with the Men of the Deeps, so it's exciting to be able to see them. They used to perform here at St. John's in Moncton. We had a quiet birthday for me this year.

When I was out visiting yesterday morning, I was in an elevator of a condo building with a woman holding four Tim Horton's coffees in a tray. I said to her, "I'm a minister, and whenever I see people like you, I say, 'Blessed are the coffee bringers." She laughed and asked me what church I was at. "St. John's, downtown." She said, "Oh! I've heard you speak! You know my aunt and uncle, Phyllis and Gordon Hicks!" Indeed, I do! We had a nice chat and I made my way down the hall, thankful for the church.

I hope you all have a good weekend, and thank you all for your support of my ministry and our ministry together. This morning, I will preside at the funeral for Wally Bone, a friend to many in our church. Wally's brother, the Rev. Bud Bone, used to be an Associate Minister here at St. John's. When I was a student in Halifax at United Memorial Church, where Bud attended, he invited me to lunch and gave me his black robe. I still have it. When the funeral home called me to tell me that Wally had died, they had written in their notes that Bud wanted "the young minister from St. John's" to do his service. He must have pre-planned that a long time ago because I certainly don't feel young anymore!



Happy Anniversary, St. John's! 52 years old isn't so bad for me, and 187 years looks good on you.




